HORTICULTURE

Voles (moles & gophers)the ongoing search for a good riddance!!

Super Sonic Repeller

Keep your landscape free of destructive burrowing critters like moles, gophers, voles, squirrels and others. Just place the waterproof aluminum tube in the soil. Underground rodents have poor eyesight. Hearing and sensitivity to ground vibrations are well developed. These senses warn gophers, moles, and other burrowing animals of danger so they flee dangerous situations. MoleControl's sonic sound bursts create ground vibrations that frighten ground rodents. Voles (moles & gophers) cont....

In response to the March issue item concerning voles:

Voles moved into my cold frame during the fall/winter a few years ago. I discovered that castor oil is not supposed to be used around food plants with the edible part present. My cold frame contains herbs. A person with the Jefferson County Extension Service spent a tremendous amount of time with me, researching the issue thoroughly.

Her and my final conclusion was that I should place a baited & set mousetrap down each vole hole. We set six and then received a large snowstorm. It was two weeks before we could get to the cold frame and open it. One trap had a moldering vole body. There were no more vole holes. We reset the traps, but no more were caught and there was no more activity. We assume the moldering body of their relative encouraged the others to vacate the premises.

I then planted a catnip plant in the middle of the cold frame. I moved an end panel so the neighbor cat would have access. I lectured him on his feline duties. I have not seen any more vole activity in my cold frame. But, we have received gifts of a number of vole bodies at our door. The only down side is that my herbs are covered in cat hairs and have to be washed carefully. I can live with that! I may try the cola idea in the future, also.

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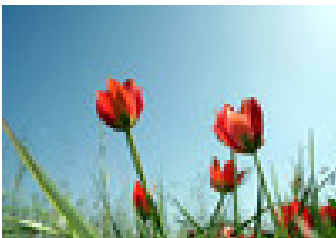
