OVER THE GARDEN FENCE—BY LIZ HAMILTON

After moving into our new house in February this year I had so many things to take care of, overwhelmed and short on cash it was hard to find funds and time to get the gardens going. I also wanted to see what the seasons would bring with light, sun and moisture to each of the areas I have chosen for gardening. However I could not live for a whole year without some kind of flowers in the garden.

So one weekend in March, between snow storms, I quickly turned over the soil, dug in a few bags of compost and scattered some seeds I had lying around. I had no idea if they would even take; some were probably 5 years old or more. Some were seeds from past member Joan Reynolds garden that I had picked up from the World Gardening Table many moons ago, some were seeds from my garden in Conifer and I also found a packet of wildflower seeds I had bought years ago and never planted. I took my chances; if it did not work I could always go and buy a few annuals on sale later in the year.

I scattered a few and gave them a good soaking, said to Kevin, "These are so old who knows if anything will come up." But surprise, surprise they all took and I have Poppies, Coreopsis, Flax, Borage, Sunflowers and a wonderful display of a variety of wild flowers all blooming in the small garden. It took just a little cash to buy some compost and a short time digging the dirt. Now I will take the extra perennials that have come up and are a little crowded and move them to other locations and slowly but surely build out the rest of the gardens without too much cost.

Saving seeds is as old as gardening itself – years ago seeds were shared between gardeners and people would save seeds from their favorite plants year after year. Today seeds are so inexpensive that we don't take the time to save them. But there is something about looking in the garden and saying to myself, that is from Joan's garden, or that is from Louise's garden, it is like every time I look I remember my good friends through the flowers they have passed on through cuttings or seeds.

Saving Seeds is easy here are some tips:

- Always choose the best quality plants, flowers, fruits and vegetables. Think about the ones that had the best flavor, productivity or vigor.
- Harvest seeds when the pods have dried on the plant.
- Place a bag over the seed stalk and shake, the seeds will fall into the bag and are easy to collect—try to catch them before they disperse (Continued on page 5)

"Flowers for a Friend" sculpture: thoughts, ideas and vision.

Louise Mounsey first met the "Flowers for a Friend" artist many years ago while working in the Metro garden. Both Louise and he were busy doing cleanup. They soon stopped to chat for a few minutes while wiping away the perspiration from their faces. Soon after they met at the Evergreen Gardening Club monthly meeting. That young man and artist was Ken Ball, our local sculpture.

Ken describes the sculpture as a woman in a garden/nature setting and a little girl handing her a bouquet of daisies as a gift. The sculpture represents many things to Ken, Louise and others who have come to love the bronze sculpture. When Ken created the sculpture he felt that the little girl giving the gift of flowers to the woman in the garden represents all of those who love nature and gardening; those who see the earth as a gift and giving back to the community through art. Louise and other Evergreen Gardening Club members also see this bronze piece as intergenerational learning, giving and sharing. The bronze statue is a gift to the City of Evergreen from the Evergreen Gardening Club.

As Louise shared.... "I started hearing more about the sculpture. A sculpture so beautiful, it caught my breath. Flowers for a Friend spoke to me as a founding member of the Evergreen Gardening Club as it speaks to Evergreen and people everywhere who has seen it. A woman reacting to a child's gift of flowers--how warm, how moving, you want to join in and be a part of this exhibit somehow."

Since that time, many discussions and ideas have formed from this beautiful bronze sculpture so graciously created by Ken Ball for the Evergreen Gardening Club. Since the original vision the sculpture committee was formed and alliances have been made throughout the community of Evergreen. "Arts for the Mountain Community" has shared their fundraising ideas and has agreed to co-sponsor "Flowers for a Friend" by maintaining and insuring the bronze on the behalf of the Evergreen Gardening Club. They have also been generous in sharing their major donor list and corporate sponsors with the sculpture committee.

The "Flowers for a Friend" sculpture committee has a basic budget, timeline of fundraising ideas and the original vision from Ken Ball and Louise Mounsey. The sculpture committee is also dedicated to donate 10% of all proceeds raised for the sculp-

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the seeds themselves.

- Cut the stalk as seeds pods look like they are about the pop, place a paper bag over the seed heads, hang upside down in the a dry place the seeds pods will pop and disperse the seeds into the bag.
- Make sure the seed is completely dry or it will rot in storage (Joan would put all her seeds in an old refrigerator in the garage to store and it seemed to work really well.)
- Remove the chaff from the seeds before storing.
- Put seeds into a small manila envelope to store, label with the variety and year.
- Put seeds packet into an air tight container and store in a cool dark dry place.
- Saved seeds are best used the following year, however as I found out, it is always worth scattering the seeds years later just in case!

MINUTES-JUNE 8, 2009 MEETING AT THE BERGEN PARK FIRE & RESCUE TRAINING CENTER

The meeting was opened by President Tina Kellogg at 9:42am. There were 30 members present, satisfying the quorum requirement. Tina welcomed several guests and five new members.

REPORTS FROM BOARD MEMBERS

President's Report: Tina discussed the need for a process to set up tax I/D's appropriate to our non-profit status. These are needed when members representing the Club deal with local merchants and nurseries. These businesses usually require the member to provide an "official" EGC phone number, which does not exist. Tina suggested using her phone number if one is requested. She also asked for volunteers to take care of phoning or mailing Club information to members who do not have e-mail access. Several members volunteered to help.

Secretary's Report: Stan Barrett read the minutes of the May 2010 general meeting and asked for comments or corrections. There were none and the minutes were approved.

Treasurer's Report: Dwight Gilliland presented a summary of the activity and balances in the Club's bank accounts as of June 30th. The balance in checking was \$1948 and the balance in savings was \$8022. He provided a copy of the summary to the secretary, to be filed with these minutes. Dwight noted that membership dues for the upcoming year need to be paid by the end of July in order that members' names be included in the new roster. Annual dues are \$25 for a member or \$35 for a family membership. VP Diana Aldridge circulated a list on which members could update their information if necessary.

NEW BUSINESS

Garden Tour Update Barb Steger said that everyone who signed up to work as docents for the Garden Tour is invited to attend the Pre-Tour on June 22nd. She will arrange car pooling to avoid parking problems at the gardens. She read a note from Marilyn Kaussner listing the artists (5) and jewel-makers (2) who will be displaying their work at various gardens during the tour.

New Board Election: Lynn Dimmick (Nominating Committee Chair) reported that the current slate of candidates for the new Board had not changed since the May meeting announcement. We still do not have a nomination for the position of Secretary. Lynn asked if there were any additional nominations from the floor. None were made, so she moved that the slate as presented be accepted as new Board members for the coming year. The motion was carried unanimously.

On behalf of the Club, Lynn thanked the outgoing President and Board members for their service during the past year. She invited them to select a plant from several that she had brought, as a token of appreciation.

Community Gardens: Tina asked any members who are not currently signed up to help in the Community Gardens to contact Karen MacFarquhar and volunteer to help on that project. Karen gave a brief update on the status of the Gardens. They are already much improved since the new planting/weeding campaign started. Susan Blake asked for help in identifying some plants in the Fire Station garden, after the meeting. She also asked members to donate flat rocks for the garden to help in holding back soil and mulch from spilling over the sidewalk.

OTHER BUSINESS

Louise Mounsey announced the World Gardening Fund table was unusually well stocked because of several donations brought by members. She described the basic purpose of the WGF as providing vegetable seeds to children in several countries so that they could start gardens to help feed their families.

There being no further business, Tina adjourned the meeting at 11:00am. Diana then introduced our Guest Speaker, Dore Huss, who gave a talk on Indoor Plants and Flower Arranging.


