Tastes Like: **Botanical Name Common Name** Agastache foeniculum Sweet, anise-like, licorice Anise Hyssop Arugula Eruca vesicarla Nutty, spicy, peppery Basil Ocimum basilicum Mild lemon, mint Calendula officinalis Poor man's saffron, spicy, tangy, peppery, adds golden hue to foods Calendula Chamaemelum nobile Faint apple, good as a tea Chamomile Chicory Cichorium intybus Tart, sharp, vinegar-like Chives Allium tuberosum Mild onion, garlicky Young buds similar to mushrooms if fried in butter Dandelion Taraxacum officinalis Dill Anthum graveolens Aromatic, used especially in pickles Jasminum sambac Delicate, sweet used in teas Jasmine Lemony, used in teas Lemon Verbena Aloysia triphylla Delicate oregano taste, sweeter, milder, slightly minty, citrusy Origanum majorana Marjoram Mentha species Tangy, fresh Mint Viola X wittrockiana Mild sweet to very tart Pansy Rosmarinus officinalis Pine-like, sweet, savory Rosemary Salvia officinalis Very strong nutty; complementary with thyme, rosemary, oregano, parsley, garlic Sage Helianthus annus Slightly bitter Sunflower Sweet, nectar flavor Squash Blossom Cucurbita pepo species Thymus vulgaris Light lemon Thyme
