The Courier had a tiny message about how to register your wireless or VolP phone to receive 911 emergency messages if you live in Jefferson County, or are served by Evergreen Fire Dept. Simply go to http://your911.org/ and follow the instructions.

Also, it is essential to think about evacuation plans. Make a list of what to take with a few minutes notice, or with an hour's notice. Have your pet carriers handy. Back up your computer on an external hard drive that is easy to grab, or on an online service. If you have a relative or really good friend down the hill, see if they have room to store your precious family photos and other important keepsakes for the duration.


April 23rd Earth Day
